

PROGRAM NOTES:

This month's program will be rather unusual. The first part will be 16mm movies taken in the early 30's in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania by Sam Arnold's father. Sam Arnold, Sr. was an engineer and designed the Heroult type electric furnace using carbon electrodes to convert pig iron into steel. The furnace was from two to fifty-ton capacity. The movie is 25 minutes long, and very rare. There is a human element in the movie also, and if OSHA were around, it would have had an absolute fit over the process.

The second portion of the evening's program will be a showing of two Blackhawk railroad movies by Carl Carlson. They will be accompanied by Duane Sole at the piano, who promises to play some real "Sole" music! Hope you can join us.

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To the uninitiated, one would have never thought that the history of articulated locomotives is so extensive or reaches back so far in railroad motive power time. Bob LeMassena's presentation at the March meeting provided a concise picture of this history, a most informative talk for those of us not familiar with the topic, and a review for those who are. Some weird contraptions with unbelievable propulsion systems hit the rails in those early days, and selected photos complemented Bob's descriptions of those and other articulated creations down through the years. He also related to us his sometimes humorous experiences compiling data and doing research work for the book, as well as the frustrations and occasionally time-consuming efforts inherent in authoring such a work. Acquiring photos taken in the later days of steam has even proved perplexing. For example, he would still like to locate color photographs of a Southern Pacific 2-8-8-2 (No.'s 4000 to 4048), a Great Northern 2-6-8-0, and a Milwaukee Road 2-6-6-2

for inclusion. Sundance Limited intends to have the 416 page ARTICULATED LOCOMOTIVES OF NORTH AMERICA available by July 4.

As with all individuals who unselfishly contribute their time to prepare and provide varied programs for the club meeting, we thank Bob for a fine program.

The nine-car train proved again that it is the ultimate way to traverse the Colorado Rockies. Weather was fine while over in Glenwood, and the downtown area and the pool provided an outlet for many who desired to roam a bit. A good dinner in the Hotel Colorado Saturday evening, was followed by the motion picture, "The Great Locomotive Chase," Walt Disney's film version of the Civil War incident. The return to Denver became even more interesting because of the incredible number of deer along the right-of-way in the late afternoon.

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THE DRAWING for MIXED TRAIN DAILY and COLORADO MIDLAND, of which participation is an option with dues renewals for this year, will take place at the April meeting.

In the meantime, work proceeds on the 346. The boiler has been stripped down and the flues removed. Efforts to rework the engine will continue on through the summer.

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
PARAMOUNT THEATER ORGAN CONCERT - On Thursday, May 17, at 8:00 P.M., a theater organ concert will be presented at the Paramount Theater, 16th & Glenarm, in Denver. Performing at the mighty Wurlitzer will be well known Denver organist, Bob Castle. The program will feature a variety of popular and light classical music, arranged to explore the almost unlimited potential of the giant Wurlitzer pipe organ, one of the most versatile musical instruments ever devised. The Paramount's organ is one of only two duo-console Wurlitzer Theater pipe organs remaining in the United States, the other located at Radio City Music Hall. Installed in the spring of 1930, it is capable of producing 10,000 different tones. Of course, the Paramount itself looks better now than it has in years, since its restoration following the disastrous fire last October. The concert is being sponsored by the Rocky Mountain Chapter of The American Theater Organ Society, a non-profit organization dedicated to the preservation of the organs at the Paramount and Aladdin theaters and other locations.

To assist in this undertaking, the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club will carry tickets for sale by mail and at the meetings for the concert. Tickets in advance are \$3.00 per person (\$3.50 at the performance) and may be obtained by sending orders to the club's post office box. 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NOW, IT'S MILLER'S (ROTARY) TIME!!! - The odor of coal smoke and hot valve permeated the air over the Chama, New Mexico yards again this winter, as the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railway fired up its motive power in March for the filming of a television beer commercial. The special train, consisting of Rotary OY, Engines 487 and 484, an outfit car and the C&TS caboose, left the yards on Thursday, March 15 and proceeded to the highway crossing north of town. There in front of two cameras, the plow train worked its way through a 14-foot drift created for the occasion by a front loader. The train then proceeded to the Narrows, where several runs were made, each time the cameras being relocated for different angles. More filming was done in the Chama yards and on Friday, filming personnel "took over" Foster's Bar & Restaurant on Chama's main street. Although four professional actors were brought in to play the role of engine crews, three C&TS crewmen, Bernie Watts, John Coker and Gary Getman were used as extras as patrons in the saloon scene. The theme of the commercial will be "Now it's Miller's Time" after the hardworking railroad crew plows the line open and breaks through to the yards. It follows the general pattern of the Miller's beer commercials currently being seen on the tube, and will be used next fall during football season.

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STEAM ON PIKES PEAK?! - The Manitou & Pikes Peak Railway is entertaining a proposal with the Colorado Railroad Museum to trade their display locomotive No. 1 with the museum's No. 4, and return the No. 4 to working order. It was operable when the museum received it from the railroad. No firm timetable has been established for the movements or the restoration work.

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NO WORD YET on the outcome of the hearings on the proposed Rio Grande Zephyr discontinuance past Grand Junction. Rumors are flying thick and fast about the imminent sale of the Silverton line to a Florida citrus grower. Between the lack of information coming out of the railroad on the possible sale of the Silverton line, their proposal to skyrocket the fare and eliminate stops on the famous run, and to amputate the Rio Grande Zephyr, the D&RGW has caused a lot of hyperventilation among Colorado residents along these two rail routes.

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WE REGRET to hear of the deaths of two long-time members. George A. Trout passed away on February 28, at the age of 84 after a short illness. George always attended meetings regularly and went on many trips. Also, Franklin Miller, 81, a retired employee of the D&RGW, died on March 21.

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A WELL WRITTEN, 6-page article about the Rio Grande Zephyr, illustrated with good color photography, found its way into the pages of DENVER MONTHLY, a local monthly magazine. If you are a Zephyr supporter, you would enjoy it. There is also a page devoted to Forest Crossen and his favorite railroad, the Switzerland Trail.

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THE RIO GRANDE SKI TRAIN completed its final Saturday and Sunday runs on March 31 and April 1. Even with no public advertising, the "Ski Train Sold Out" sign could be seen posted in Union Station during the last weeks of operation.


