The Club has suffered a great loss with Charlie's passing. He passed away on August 30th, just short of his 80th birthday. Once a familiar "fixture" at Club activities, Charlie's participation the past few years had been limited due to ill health.

Born in Wadsworth, Ohio, Charlie had sort of a "boomer" orientation in his early days. traveling the country, working in the logging industry, sheep ranching, U.S. Army and...hoboing. In 1993, he wrote his memories and published TEENAGE HOBO IN THE 1930's. a book illustrated with photos of the many places he visited while riding the rails. In 1949, he settled in Colorado and married Dorothy Max in October of 1947. Eventually, he began participating in RMRRC activities and, in 1973 and 1974, became President while also managing Club trips. His most recent contribution to the Club was woodwork repairs on D&IM Interurban No. 25. He was an active member in other organizations including the Intermountain Chapter, NRHS, Masons and church. In the Kiwanis, he devoted time to projects benefiting underprivileged children, and, was a long supporter of the Colorado Boys Ranch in Lamar. His various hobbies included travel, golf, HO models, artwork fro metal (sheet metal was his profession), wood carving, the harmonica and oil painting of trains, ships and scenery. Charlie had a wonderful sense of humor and dry wit which he maintained even during his illness. He would have thought it "cool" to have the sounds of working steam locomotives that were played in the background during his funeral service and the song "I've Been Working on the Railroad" sung by those present. Our sympathies are extended to Dorothy and brothers Frank and Paul. Those who knew this "character" Charlie will certainly miss him. (Darrell Arndt)



One of the unique opportunities afforded by the preservation of the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad, is the running of special trains such as the Jim Trowbridge Freight Train which takes rail fans back into history with Rio Grande trains of the late 30's, 40's and 50's. This year, Bill Lund, of the Rio Grande Southern Modelers Club, put together a special trip to represent the Rio Grande Southern, utilizing K-27 #463. The locomotive was relettered "Rio Grande Southern #455." Here we see the 455 preparing to depart "Rico" (Chama, NM) with its freight consist.

RIO GRANDE SOUTHERN 455 RETURNS

On August 23, 1997, the Rio Grande (C&TS) 463 was relettered to RGS 455 for a freight special sponsored by the Rio Grande Southern Modelers Club. They also relettered Caboose 0503 to RGS 0404 (which now resides at the Colorado Railroad Museum).

The weeks prior to the trip, the locomotive and caboose began the transformation to the RGS. The locomotive was relettered in the same method as all other locomotives on the C&TS property with computer generated graphics on a vinyl film. The caboose was handled differently. A vinyl material similar

to "Contact Paper" was applied in $3\frac{1}{2}$ " strips covering the space of the RIO GRANDE logo top to bottom on the car. The vinyl was then painted the same color as the caboose. The RGS logo was then hand painted. The process of converting the locomotive was like watching RGS photographs coming to life!

On Friday, August 22nd, a night photo shoot was held. These photos were taken in the Chama yards, next to freight cars, the enginehouse (representing the RICO engine house), and the water tank.

On Saturday, 8 photo runbys were held in places like UPPER GALLAGERS (MP 332), KEYSTONE HILL (Coxo Curve), and BRIDGE 45A

(Los Pinos trestle). So, you need to use your imagination a little! The special had cars set out on the line to represent a day in the life of the Rio Grande Southern. The switching moves made for some great photography throughout the day. The make-up of the train was different throughout the day, and ended up being 19 cars long.

The RGS 455 Returns was a first of its kind on the C&TS--watching RGS steam for the first time in 44 years. The trip was sponsored by Bill Lund. The ghost of the RGS might hold another trip in August of 1999.

THE COMBUSTION CORNER— CURRENT RAILROAD HAPPENINGS

WYOMING POWDER RIVER BASIN NEWS. The BNSF/Union Pacific Railroads' Powder River Basin operations continue to produce new records as the mines spill forth abundant coal output. Distributed Power is now is use on both railroads' operations, with BNSF now operating BNSF SD70MAC's (termed Integrated Distributed Power). Units capable of this are: BNSF Dash 9-44CW (usually used on grain trains) 960-1123; BNSF SD75M's 8251-8275; SD70MAC's 9713-9724 and 9776-9837. The Integrated Distributed Power trains usually have two units up front and one on the rear.

Trackwork in the Powder River Basin continues to expand:

- +Antelope Creek now has three bridges, eliminating the bottleneck there.
- +Logan Hill is having a fourth track built--the Broadway of the Coal Fields!
- +Third, track grading is evident around Bill, WY, north to Logans Hill.

Union Pacific has reassigned some familiar Chicago & North Western (CNW) power back to the Powder River Basin. GE model AC4400CW's, CNW 8801-8835 (will become UP 6803-6837). They are kept on the run from South Morrill, NE, into the Wyoming Powder River Basin to help get the loaded trains over the hills.

UP also keeps many of its newest units on

the coal trains. EMD-built SD90MAC's, series 8200-8224, will be assigned to coal hauling duties. GE's 6000-horsepower units: UP 7000-7047, are General Electric's entry into the "black diamond hauling" business.

UP has its fuel tenders working the PRB too. Fuel tenders are numbered UPT 5-8, and are usually found working with GE model AC4400CW's: UP 6840-6845 and UP 6580.

OMNITRAX SHIPS REBUILT SW-1500 TO MID WEST CORN PROCESSING (MCP) WITH CORN COB HERALD. BNSF moved recently rebuilt ex-Southern Pacific SW-1500 #2749 from Omnitrax's Loveland, CO, shop to Denver, CO, on August 22, 1997. The switcher now wears MCP's attractive green paint scheme with a yellow and white band mid-way up the unit. The company's corn cob herald with the outline of Minnesota is on the long hood. The unit departed Denver eastbound August 23, 1997, bound for Marshall, MN. (Andy E. & Joe S.)

TENNESSEE PASS CLOSED TO THROUGH TRAINS AUGUST 23, 1997. The end for through freight service over the Royal Gorge/Tennessee Pass line has come! Union Pacific closed down and deactivated signals/Centralized Traffic Control on the Royal Gorge and Tennessee Pass route Augst 23, 1997. Through trains no longer transverse the Pueblo, Salida, Minturn, Dotsero, CO, route.

Only locals remain on both ends, and work trains picking up track/signal equipment were working out of Minturn and Canyon City, CO. D&RGW GP-30 #3002 was the assigned work train power working out of Minturn. The coal and taconite business were the last trains to run.

The last through trains to operate over the Royal Gorge/Tennessee Pass line were:

Eastbound, August 22, 1997: CWECS-20 with 104 coal loads handled by SP 262/252/UP 7021 with rear SP 348/UP 7017 and added 4-unit mid-train helper UP 7014/SP 164/369/ UP 7024, departing Minturn at 8:58 p.m.

Westbound, August 23, 1997: OMIGV-19 with 96 Taconite loaded coal cars with SP 262 & 219. Mid-train were SP 108, 241 and 9607, departing Minturn at 8:16 p.m. Note that the last trains departed

almost 24 hours apart, and had the same lead unit, as the SP 262 was cut off a*Pueblo, CO, and turned to run west. (Steve R. & Joe M.)

BNSF DASH 9-44CW 700-SERIES UNITS SPORT DIFFERENT NOSE HERALDS. BNSF is currently receiving 100 General Electric manufactured model Dash 9-44CW's, numbered 700-799. Published reports have indicated that BNSF 725 is the lowest numbered unit with BNSF showing up in the cigar band, ATSF style nose herald. However, BNSF 718 is the lowest numbered unit seen with this BNSF herald. The other units sport a Santa Fe cigar band style nose herald.

One of the first 700's seen through Denver was on August 15th when BNSF 719 took a grain empty north via the Joint Line and then headed east to Lincolm, NE. The train had BNSF 719, ATSF 5970 and ATSF 5866 handling the 108-grain empties.

BNSF has painted other units in its BNSF pumpkin (aka Great Northern inspired Northern lines scheme: green and orange with BNSF lettering). BNSF SD40-2 #7079 wasighted at least three times in August, 1997, operating on the Z-CHIDEN (Chicago-Denver, United Parcel Service intermodal train). This unit then went south via the Joint Line on a DENFTW (Denver to Fort Worth, TX) train in late August, 1997. The unit was painted by VMV, having been involved in the Cape Girardeau, MO, accident.

Another recently painted BNSF green and orange unit is BNSF 6915. It was on the point of the Pasco, WA, to Houston train (H OASHOU4-23) and through Denver, CO, on August 28, 1997, via the Front Range line (ex-Colorado & Southern) and the Joint Line.

BNSF warbonnet-painted Dash 9-44CW #711 was seen operating on the Denver to Barstow, CA, train, departing Denver on September 1, 1997. The two Santa Fe warbonnet units, ATSF 611 and BNSF 711 were the power for the H DENBAR1-31. The 711's nose herald was Santa Fe, and its long hood carried the BNSF initials. (C.W.)

BNSF HELPS UNION PACIFIC OUT IN MAKING UP TRAINS. Union Pacific's 36th Street Yard,

Denver, CO, was overcrowded with trains, and the BNSF helped out by making up a train. UP train M DVROX-Ol (Manifest, Denver to Roper Yard, Salt Lake City, UT) with three UP units, UP 6814 leading, was made up at BNSF's 31st Street Yard since UP's 36th Street Yard was full on September 1, 1997. The Denver to Salt Lake City, Roper Yard train departed via the Delgany Wye, north through UP's 36th Street Yard, Brighton, CO, and onto Wyoming where it turned west. (Andy)

MARLBORO TRAIN SCRAPPED, AUGUST, 1997. The Philip Morris Marlboro train was scrapped at its Rader Railcar, Aurora, CO, plant in the first half of August, 1997. Using a giant scissor device mounted on construction equipment, the cars were cut up in the builder's yard. Two of the dormitory cars, single level sleepers, have been retained and were seen on trucks on Rader's siding.

Philip Morris USA's plan for a luxury train built to carry 2,000 Marlboro Country sweepstakes winners across the West never turned a wheel. The train was commissioned in 1995, and was planned to operate between Denver, CO, north into Wyoming and onto Montana, using BNSF and Union Pacific lines.


The <u>Wall Street Journal</u> reported the train's construction costs had spiraled to \$90 million. Philip Morris cancelled the contract with Rader Railcar in February, 1997. Plans to transfer the cars to another builder never materialized, and cars were cut up before ever seeing a rail.

SOO AND CANADIAN PACIFIC POWER ON BNSF. Burlington Northern Sants Fe's Barstow, CA, to Denver, CO, train arrived in Denver on September 8, 1997, with Soo Line 6609 (white scheme) and Canadian Pacific 6038 (red scheme). The northbound train arrived via the Joint Line at Littleton in the afternoon with with Soo 6609/CP 6038/BN 7039. Normally, foreign power is regulated to the middle or rear of a power consist. (Eric)

WYOMING/COLORADO PASSENGER CARS MOVE SOUTH VIA BNSF. Two ex-Wyoming/Colorado (WYCO)

cars, ex-ATSF, were seen moving from the Union Pacific to BNSF at Denver on September , 1997. One car is WYCO 1395. The other car had the name RENDEZVOUS. Both cars were moved from UP's 36th Street Yard over to BNSF's 31st Street Yard at Denver.

Both cars departed Denver September 9th on BNSF train DENLAJ1-09 (Denver to La Junta, CO, of September 9th), seen in South Denver at 10:45 a.m. The cars are stainless steel and look to be coaches. Likely destination is Clarkdale, Arizona--the Verde River Railroad. (America Online: Cozephyr)
