



Durango & Silverton Charter Trip Saved



On Wednesday, August 10th, the Club was informed that the FRA would not allow the Eureka & Palisade #4 to operate during Railfest. The Club's 34 ticket holders were called and asked if they would go on an alternate train for the photographer's charter. Only 23 ticket holders agreed to the alternate train and it looked like the trip would be cancelled. At the last minute, an anonymous donor agreed to make up the difference between ticket sales and trip cost. The railroad agreed to run a mixed consist with locomotive #473, three box cars (3134, 3749, 3275), one flat car, one original wood coach and the short caboose.

A 7:00 AM departure put our train out first. The crew did two runpasts at Elbert Creek on the rock ledge below Rockwood then one on the high line. We continued on to the High Bridge below Tacoma for two more photo runs. We waited for the two D&S Silverton bound trains, photographed those and Goose #5 that followed. The High Bridge was covered in fine style! There was one more runpast at Milepost 473 and then we went to Cascade Canyon for the scheduled noon meet with the Goose. We had one more runpast at the west switch at Cascade before enjoying lunch.

We departed for Durango at 1:00 PM with three runpasts north of Tacoma followed by two stunning photo runs on the big curve on the high line in brilliant sunshine. From Rockwood to Durango it was time to relax. Wine and cheese were served and the group had time to reflect on the success of the day. For most aboard, this was the their first encounter with a small group charter. With a small group we were able to go to locations that would not accommodate a larger group.



Trains Move Army to National Training Center


The BNSF operated several Army unit trains from Fort Carson, Colorado, south via La Junta, Colorado, to Amarillo, Texas. Then they moved westward via the Transcon to the National Training Center at Fort Irwin, California. BNSF Kelker, Colorado, to Barstow, California, trains started departing 8/1/05. The first two trains were U KELBAR1 01A and U KELBAR2 01A. The third train had BNSF SD60M 9289 on train U KELBAR1 02A. Bradley Fighting vehicles and M1 Abrams tanks were moved on Department of Defense flatcars.

40-Car Union Pacific Coal Train Pile-up at Hanna, WY

An eastbound Union Pacific coal load from Utah derailed at Hanna, Wyoming about 4:20 PM on Saturday, 9/10/05. The C COTSH 05 (loaded at Co-op Mining near Price, Utah) was doing about 50 mph behind three units hauling 105-loads (14,547 ton) on main track number two. The 36th car, UP 28414, experienced a side frame failure. It derailed along with the following 39 cars into a major pile up. Both main tracks were blocked. The cars that derailed were a mixture of UP, MCHX, CEFX and FURX.

Investigators were looking at the Brazilian forged truck bolster on the 36th car. The investigation was still underway when this report went to press.

UP detoured one coal empty via Colorado to Co-op Mining southwest of Price, Utah. UP train C TVCO1 09 with 105-empties was routed via Limon, Colorado, passing there at 5:50 PM on 9/12/05. The train continued west via Denver, Bond and Grand Junction towards



UP 3985 departed Cheyenne, Wyoming, 8/24/05 on a six-state, 2,800-mile tour to Portland, Oregon, to celebrate railroad heritage. On 8/25/05, UP 3985 was at Rock Springs, Wyoming, where it met UP C45ACCTE 5466 on the Eugene, Oregon, to North Platte, Nebraska, train M EUNP 21. The Challenger was on display at Ogden, Utah, until 8/29/05. At 8 AM (MDT), 3985 rolled west across the Great Salt Lake causeway (the former SP mainline) and ran via Elko, Nevada. Freshly Painted UPY 1295

North Little Rock, Arkansas, painted UPY switcher 1295 on 8/15/05. The switcher, ex-Southern Pacific 2696 built by EMD as model MP-15 in 1974, moved from Arkansas to Colorado. It was at UP's Denver Locomotive Shop on 9/16/05. The unit was painted inside and out. New seats were installed for the engineer and trainmen. The unit is equipped for remote control operation. UP hostlers moved it from Denver Locomotive Shop to North Yard the afternoon of 9/18/05.

Korean Train

Amtrak operated a special 15-car train from New York, across the country to Los Angeles, California, for Korean artist Jheon Soocheon. The train was called "The Moving Drawing of Jheon Soocheon." It operated September 12 to 21, 2005. The train made stops at New York City, Washington D.C., Chicago, St. Louis, Garden City, Kansas, Albuquerque, New Mexico, Grand Canyon, Arizona and Los Angeles.

The sponsor was the Korean Ministry of Culture and Tourism. Supporters were Hyundai Motors and Samsung Electronics.

All cars were wrapped in white tarps. The train moved westward across Colorado on 9/18/05. The train operated as Amtrak number 93 when it crossed Colorado.

Crystal clear blue skies and moderate temperatures provided a great environment in which to show off Denver & Intermountain Interurban No. 25 to visitors to Building 78 at the Denver Federal Center on September 17th. Even the 30-40 mph winds that were predicted for the afternoon never materialized.

There were the familiar faces of those who have enjoyed the open house in the past plus visitors who have never seen the car before. What a pleasure to renew acquaintances and make new ones. How did the car look? Perhaps the best indication was from a man who, seeing the car for the first time, stated "It is so beautiful I hate to step inside of it!" He eventually did, of course, as did 180 other folks who were issued complimentary tickets to ride the car. The "long distance award" goes to visitor Terry from England who accompanied Dave Gross to the site and then headed for the airport mid-day!

Adding to the enjoyment of the open house this year were a couple of other attractions. Joe Priselac, long time Club member and contributor to the Club and Foundation, presented an art show of his railroad paintings. It seemed like there was seldom an empty spot on the floor in front of the paintings as visitors gathered around to view the paintings and visit with the artist. His selection of ten paintings highlighted Denver's traction history

including D&IM No. 25 near Golden, the Denver & Interurban at Westminster, the Leyden line with the C&S narrow gauge at Arvada, a Denver Tramway trolley bus and narrow gauge city car at the state capitol and a downtown winter scene at night in the theater district.

A special attraction, especially for the kids, was Gary Collins' miniature yellow trolley, No. 25, pulled behind his garden tractor. This 400 pound replica of a trolley included a real controller, gong, cane seats and authentic advertising car cards and can be operated with railroad wheels or on rubber tires as it was done for the open house. It is an ingenious model that Gary built in 1985 to give the "little ones" a taste of our trolley heritage.

Transportation of the trolley and tractor to the open house was provided by Rich Berens.




