

November 20, 1960, was the date of the first Rocky Club trip with U.P. #844. The participants rode from Denver to Cheyenne with diesel power, and then steam power from Chey-

enne to Rawlins and back, with diesels finishing up from Cheyenne to Denver. Union Pacific commemorated the 50th anniversary of this locomotive's excursion service with a special passenger run


from Omaha to North Platte, Nebraska, last month. The Anniversary Special was a fund-raising event for The Union Pacific Railroad Museum in the Omaha, Nebraska, depot. When the crew got together just days before the trip, long-time steam team leader Steve Lee announced that he would be retiring soon and that this would be his last run. The new manager of heritage operations in Cheyenne is Ed Dickens Jr.

Also in mid-November, the Iowa Interstate RR ran a steam special to benefit the Rock Island Technical Society. They used engine #7801, a 2-10-2, between Des Moines and Council Bluffs.

Tourist Railway Association, Inc. held their 2010 convention in Alamosa, Colorado, in early November, hosted by the San Luis & Rio Grande Railroad. Of course there were a few standard and narrow gauge steam train rides associated with the convention. The Friends Of The Cumbres & Toltec Scenic Railroad gave a demonstration of pile driver "OB" in Antonito and then the C&TSRR gave them a ride to Sublette and back.

In the northeastern U.S., the state of Maine has acquired 233 miles of track from the Montreal, Maine and Atlantic Railway. The state Governor says this rail line will help to protect thousands of


jobs and major employers in two counties. Also from that region, the Edaville railroad opened in 1947 when a man built a five mile narrow gauge line at his cranberry operation in Massachusetts. Edaville is currently hosting what may be it's last annual Festival of Lights, since the owner has the place up for sale.

The Association of American Railroads said there were 318,275 freight cars stored as of November 1st, meaning those cars had not been used in revenue service for at least 60 days. That is over 20 percent of the total fleet in the U.S.

and Canada. At the bottom of the recession, nearly 32 percent of all North American railcars were stored, and the AAR said owners have pulled 185,000 out of storage since mid-2009. Traffic levels have been rebounding this year, particularly in intermodal movements. Some forecasters are estimating that over 22,000 new freight cars will be needed in 2011.

STI-Global, Ltd., an Australian hightech company, purchased a majority share of Santa Fe Southern Railway recently. STI develops rail safety and risk


mitigation technology. Their CEO said that acquiring the SFS gives the company a U.S. railroad to test and market systems, including Positive Train Control. The SFS is a former AT&SF branch line that runs from its namesake city 18 miles to Lamy, New Mexico.

Rocky Mountain Railroad Historical Foundation Report

At the November Board meeting, the officers and directors unanimously agreed to continue exploring the future role of the Foundation. Using input from several members, consensus was that the Board should retain the Foundation's 501(c)(3) status and that we should look at various ways to serve our members and the rail community in Colorado

Suggestions included possible funding (or matching funding) of selected historic preservation projects, developing an on-line repository of rail photographs, coordinating the receipt and placement of collections of photographs, slides, memorabilia and/or books, digitizing historic videos and photos and partnering with other organizations to serve the Foundation's mission, which will be updated as plans are further refined.


