## From The President By Dave Schaaf

I hope to see many of our members at the annual Club Banquet in October. We have a lot of door prizes this year, including tickets for steam trains.

Late August was busy with events in southern Colorado and northern New Mexico. To meet our deadline this month, we will have more coverage and photos in the next issue.

Union Pacific has agreed to donate former Denver & Rio Grande Western SD40T-2 locomotive #5401 to the Colorado RR Museum. This 1980 EMD "tunnel motor" is the second diesel of its kind to be preserved, as #5371 now resides at the Utah State Railroad Museum in Ogden. The Regional Transportation District of Denver (RTD) broke ground in late August for the 22.8-mile East Corridor commuter-rail line to Denver International Airport. In addition to the East Corridor line, the project's first phase includes construction of a new maintenance facility, provision of the trains that will provide service on the line, and final design work on the FasTracks Gold Line and Northwest Rail Electrified Segment.

Fort Collins Municipal Railway car #21 suffered a broken axle on July 25. It's a major failure for this Birney car that was built in 1919. Efforts are underway to get new axles made. Their car #25 is still being restored as well.

Work continues on RGS #20, still in the shop at Strasburg, Pennsylvania. The front flue sheet is welded in and the firebox is being final fit for welding. The frame is complete and ready for tramming. The driving boxes have been partially machined and will be final machined when tramming is complete. Staybolts are being made at this time. They will be starting the smokebox soon so it can be attached to the cylinder saddle, and then the boiler slipped into it.

A luxury train service owned by Denver billionaire Philip Anschutz has been mothballed even before its first trip. We had mentioned in June that American Railway Explorer had proposed to begin running train excursions in the summer of 2011, with prices as high as \$1,500 a day per person. However, the company told travel industry officials in August that the venture's "operations have ceased."

There is talk that the old DSP&P station at Jefferson, Colorado, may be sold and moved out of the South Park area.

# A New Future For Interurban Car No. 25

The Denver streetcar and interurban rail system was converted to buses in the late nineteen-forties and early fifties. Denver & Intermountain car #25 was purchased by the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club to save it from being scrapped in October of 1950. It was operated for special excursions for about three more years until the end of electrification on the Golden line that ran along 13th Avenue through Lakewood. Stored outside in the Golden area during the mid-fifties, it was placed on static display at the Colorado RR Museum in 1958. Thirty years later, the Club made the decision to restore this car to it's original condition of 1911, and moved it to a railroad shed on the grounds of the Denver Federal Center. It was thought that this restoration would take just a few years.

In the most recent couple of years, our board of directors found out that the Federal Center is being re-developed for civilian uses, and the building where the car has been housed cannot stay there much longer. The restoration is now essentially complete, and the Board looked for a new future for the car, preferably in the Denver area.

The Denver Rail Heritage Society operates the Platte Valley Trolley on the west side of the river in downtown Den-

ver. The city of Lakewood, Colorado, has a great interest in its local history. Both of these entities had made offers to the Rocky Mountain RR Club and Foundation for Car #25. Through extensive negotiations, an agreement was reached for these two parties to form a non-profit organization to acquire the car, which then made an offer that the Foundation accepted. The new West Corridor Historical Rail Cooperative held its first open house in mid-August, to celebrate and introduce the public to the next step in the car's journey.

Plans are in place for this car to be housed in a railcar restoration facility and museum at the Oak Street station on RTD's new West Corridor line, which is scheduled to open in 2013, nearly on the grade where it used to run. This facility would allow for additional restorations of other trolley cars and provide a regional history of urban transit, and create a destination stop for visitors. The vision is eventually to be able to use Car #25 for special runs on street trackage between Oak Street station and the Westland shopping area on Colfax Avenue. On occasion, Car #25 will make special appearances at the Platte Valley Trolley operation.







# Narrow Gauge Locomotive Photo Gallery



Denver & Rio Grande Western class K-28 (Mikado 2-8-2) is shown at Chama, New Mexico, in 1941. This locomotive was built by American Locomotive Company at Schenectady, New York, in 1923. Apparently considered surplus, seven of this class were purchased by the U.S. Army for use on the White Pass & Yukon in October 1942. Only engines 473, 476 and 478 were retained by the Rio Grande. – Photo from the James L. Ehernberger collection.



D&RGW class K-28 had arrived in Durango on the **San Juan** passenger train from Alamosa in 1940. Engine 477 was also built at Schenectady, New York, in 1923. After about three years service on the White Pass & Yukon during WW-II, the U.S. Army sold the engine to a Seattle dealer who could not find a buyer and scrapped the engine. – Photo from the James L. The former D&RGW 477 was numbered 255 on the White pass & Yukon Railroad. The Rio Grande had used this class on the Santa Fe Branch (abandoned in 1941) and on the Gunnison Passenger Train (discontinued in November 1940) and could spare them to the U.S. Army for Alaska service. # The Restored Rico At The Colorado Railroad Museum

Club members were treated to a preview tour of the restored Business Car "Rico" with rides behind Engine 346 at the Colorado Railroad Museum on July 23rd, the day before the public debut of the historic Victorian railcar at Wild West Days.

"Rico" was originally a railcar on the Denver and Rio Grande and was later sold to the Rio Grande Southern and remodeled to a business car. This business car was used by well known photographer William Henry Jackson in the 1890s on a photographic tour of Colorado.

"Rico" was extensively remodeled by the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club before it was donated to the Museum in 2006. The Museum has restored this famous railcar back to service. The exterior was repainted, while the interior was cosmetically restored and decorated to the 1890s.



Richard Luckin will present his latest PBS documentary, *Rails to Suburbia: The Strang Line and Overland Park*, produced for the Overland Park Historical Society. "Immediately at the door of Kansas City lies the garden spot of the world," an early promotional brochure proclaimed. While founder William B. Strang, Jr. may have overstated the case a bit, his planned community was nonetheless a desirable suburban retreat, almost from the start. Today, Overland Park is the second-largest city in Kansas.

*Rails to Suburbia* tells the story of his interurban railway, which ran from Kansas City to Olathe and providing a fast and efficient commute, through vintage photos, interviews with local historians and public officials, and narration, once again, from actor Michael Gross.
