In Remembrance Bob LeMassena

Bob LeMassena, well known for his knowledge of railroads and especially articulated steam locomotives, passed away on Tuesday, October 1, 2013, at age 99. Bob was president of the Club in 1951 and again in 1956. He authored many volumes on railroad history and technology, several for the Colorado Railroad Museum as rail annuals. He was a volunteer at the CRRM until age 97. Bob was the ultimate authority on the technology of the steam locomotive, and he left much of it to us in his books. Bob was cremated with his ashes scattered at Tennessee Pass – what a fitting place for him.

Preparations are proceeding for the coming move of UP #4014 from California to Wyoming. Video updates are posted on the internet regularly. See youtube.com, and then simply search for "4014 restoration". Most of the news comes from Union Pacific itself about this Big Boy steam locomotive.


Silverton, Colorado, attorney Anthony Edwards is leading a fund-raising effort to rebuild a section of the old Silverton Northern Railroad, describing the current effort as "the first phase of a long-term project in the valley." Silverton Northern Railroad President, Fritz Klinke, said the railroad has obtained the right of way with a 99-year lease from the county for the cost of \$99. Track has been secured for the project at no cost and a Model T Track Inspection vehicle as well as other rail stock was found for use on the line. The Cumbres & Toltec Scenic RR has been on the National Register of Historic Places up to now, and recently became a National Historic Landmark.

Tucson, Arizona has a couple of streetcars testing on their new system now. The Sun Link line should have 8 cars running when it opens next summer.

BNSF Railway recently opened a new logistics park near Kansas City, an area that already sees the highest rail freight tonnage in the U.S. Within 10 years they expect to handle 1.5 million containers annually, and more than 6000 jobs could be created in the area.

Pueblo, Colorado, is trying to get included on the route of the Southwest Chief passenger trains. BNSF has been hinting at moving the service off of Colorado trackage and onto a more southerly passage. Nationwide, Amtrak

On October 7, 2013, through October 16, 2013, BNSF conducted adhesion tests over Raton pass with the new six axle locomotives with four powered axles. EMDX 1211/1212 Were the EMD SD70ACe P4s attending along with the BNSF 6598/6599 GE ES44 C4s. Also involved were BNSF 4038 -944CW, and BNSF 7824 ES44DC for baseline testing. BNSF research cars Kootenai River and Canyon Diablo were used. EMDX 1212 is leading at Wootton Curve on one of the early morning runs all the way to Wootton (tunnel).

Engines were run up the hill to mp 649.8 in an attempt to stall them under load. Water spray was used as well to simulate wet rail conditions. In some of the tests. The east facing unit would provide resistance to the leader with dynamic brakes. After a couple runs all the way to the top at Wootton, the train would test between Gallinas and the mp 649.8 detector. Main two was used as it is the harder pull and the train stayed out of the way of Amtrak.


carried a record 31.6 million passengers in Fiscal Year 2013, the tenth ridership record in 11 years.




The RTD line to the Denver airport under construction on the east side of Pena Boulevard in Denver on October 6, 2013. – Photo © 2013 Dave Schaaf.




BNSF 619 was the rear distributed power on detoured BNSF Denver to Fort Collins, Colorado, train M DENFCL4 20a, running on Union Pacific rails. Union Pacific handled the first BNSF detour train as symbol FM DVCY 20 (foreign movement – Denver to Cheyenne, Wyoming). BNSF's Front Range Subdivision was damaged in various locations by flood waters at Boulder, Berthoud, Longmont and Loveland, Colorado, on or about September 13, 2013. Englewood Depot Update

Following a July 1, 2013, decision by the Englewood City Council, the Englewood Depot is headed toward becoming a letterpress museum and operation.

When purchased by Denver residents Tom and Patti Parson, their intention is to rehabilitate the historic part of the building and make it accessible for public use. The space in the lower level foundation / basement would be finished and opened as a living museum of letterpress printing and related arts. The collection and focus would be on printing and graphic design of the time period of the depot, but not specifically railroad materials or exhibits.

The Englewood Historic Preservation Society had submitted a proposal to turn the depot into a museum. The group planned to submit application for grants in order to restore the depot and start museum operations. Their proposal for the depot was not the one chosen.

A Brief History Of The Depot Provided by Mr. Dave Paschal, Historian, Englewood Historic Preservation Society.

At the numerous urgings by the Cities of Englewood and Sheridan, the Englewood Depot was built by the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railway Company in 1915 replacing a small wood frame open air building used as the train station since 1898. The Depot was built on the same property the earlier station occupied. The land had been donated in 1890 by Peter Mangus, a resident of Sheridan, for the D&RGW to build the original station. Although, the Depot was named Englewood by the AT&SF as the official stop, the building was actually in the Sheridan City Limits. There was not a common use agreement between the railroads using the Depot. To accommodate both the AT&SF and the D&RGW, a separate set of tracks for each line had to be provided.

Englewood Depot Update

The Englewood Depot, which opened on June 1, 1915, is the only Colorado example of the mission style railroad depot designed by the Santa Fe Railway Company. Only a few

of the fifty mission type depots along the Santa Fe railway system included a baggage and freight facility. Because of the tonnage commitment by both cities, the Englewood Depot was built with a baggage and freight annex complete with a high capacity scale and a 125 foot long wooden plank loading dock serviced by a dedicated track and switching capability. Today, only two mission style stations remain. One serves as a U.S. Post Office in Glorieta, New Mexico and the other is the Englewood Depot with the unique freight annex. The Depot ceased all operations during the mid to late 1970s.

In 1910, five years prior to the construction of the Depot; a Denver realtor, John D. Valentine, ventured into the floral business. He had an idea to create an expansion of the floral industry by networking sales with other florists by telegraph. Initially, 14 floral companies became part of the system. This group, called the Floral Telegraph Delivery Association, evolved into what is known today as the FTD. Valentine coined the slogan, "Say it with flowers". The combination of the completion of the Englewood Depot in 1915 and the numerous carnation flower growers in the Englewood area encouraged Valentine's company, Park Floral, to purchase the Depot property which gave Park Floral access to the local growers, the telegraph,

and improved shipping capabilities. It can be said that FTD's roots are an integral part of the Depot's history.

During WW I and WW II, the Englewood

Depot was a vital link as a marshalling area for the troops at Fort Logan. WW II prisoners destined for Fort Logan were processed through the Depot. After WW II, the 1945 passenger and freight demands began to decline. For economic reasons, the Santa Fe Railway Company closed a number of its facilities along their Southwestern lines. The Englewood Depot passenger service ceased operation in late 1945. The Depot freight facility remained in operation. The freight complex in La Junta, Colorado still served the main East-West line from Chicago to Los Angeles and freight and coal movement remained high in this region. The D&RGW, the AT&SF, and the Colorado and Southern (C&S) all used the freight operation at the Englewood Depot.

The Depot was targeted for demolition in 1993 to make way for the Light Rail project from Denver to the Littleton and the south suburban area. Due to public interest, the building was moved on September 19, 1994, from its original location at Hampden and Santa Fe to South Galapago and Dartmouth, in Englewood.

On November 9, 1994, the State of Colorado Historical Society (now Colorado History) designated the Englewood Depot as a State Historical Building.
