NEWS FROM THE DURANGO & SILVERTON NG RR

Club member, Bob Griswold has been in Southwestern Colorado recently and sent us the folowing story:

Durango & Silverton 1988 Opening

The Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad began its 1988 season on the May 7 and 8 weekend amid local fanfare and band music at the historic 1881 Durango depot. Of special interest to the railfans were the Sunday afternoon tours of the private cars, roundhouse, and the carshops led by Amos Cordova.

After the groups of about fifteen persons took a look at the very busy reservation office (even on a Sunday afternoon), Mrs. Cole guided the vistors through the private car, Cinco Animas, caboose #0505, past the flanger to the Railcamp box car #3681, and the private car, Nomad.

Steve Jackson, the general roundhouse foreman, then led the groups through the call room to the machine shop and the roundhouse where locomotives #478, #480, #481, #476, and #473 were undergoing final repairs and adjustments prior to assignments for the 1988 tourist season. Locomotive #497 was handling the Silverton train that Sunday, and #481 was under steam just for an emergency. Such preparedness enabled the railroad to keep operating last season when the potato truck hit #473.

When the groups left the roundhouse, Daniel Webb gave all the visitors a ride on the turntable on the way to the carshop where coach #257 had just been beautifully restored. The main atrractions at the car shop were the new 32-seat railbus, Tamarron #1001, and its trailer #1002. Jim Sims, the carshop foreman had every right to be very proud of the three new pieces of rolling stock shown to the public for the first time.

The Tamarron will operate out of Rockwood to Elk Park and to Cascade primarily for hikers, back packers, and those who want to take a short trip on the Animas River Railway. Although #1001 is a beautiful motor car, it is not an adequate substitute for the coal-fired steam engines on the regular Silverton trains. (Bob Griswold)

The Durango Herald (copies received from Club members Lloyd Crews and John Dillavou) gave some additional information about the new railbus:

<u>D&SNG To Begin Season With New 'Railbus'</u> Service

"The diesel-fueled, two car 'railbus' will operate out of Rockwood near Tamarron Resort and make three trips daily. The railbus can carry 80 passengers in an hour and 40 minute trip. The railbus will be operated separately from the daily summer runs of the D&SNG, and will bring winter train service back to Southwest Colorado, which was discontinued in the fall of 1986. The railbus will run through February with six weeks off before service starts again. Fares start at \$12.00 and go up to \$26.00 for a round-trip from Rockwood to Elk Park Wye."

The Durago Herald also noted that although ticket prices for the regular train runs on the D&SNG were increased 15 percent this season (Roundtrip increased to \$32.30 compared to \$28.10 last year), reservations are 30 percent higher than this time last year.

WORKDAY RESULTS AT THE COLORADO RAILROAD MUSEUM

The turnout was doubled from last year as twenty-five RMRRC members attended the May 14th workday at the Colorado Railroad Museum. Among the projects completed were the painting of the letterboards and end platforms of the RICO, the painting of the end platforms of the CABOOSE 0578, the cleaning of the traction motors/trucks of INTERURBAN NO 25, the cleaning and repair of P.C.C. CAR 3101, the cleaning of BIRNEY NO. 22, the complete painting and organizing of the Clubs SHOP CAR and the removal of the cast iron dome rings on the RGS NO. 20 for inspection for possible running.

Bill Gould, Equipment Chairman, wishes to thank all who participated. Bill was very pleased with the work accomplished. Those participating were treated to lunch, and, while completing lots of worthwhile work, also enjoyed the comradeship of such an event.

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NO. 75 IN ACTION AGAIN

Once again, Everett Rohrer's locomotive, former Great Western No. 75, has returned to the TV screen--not in a movie, but in a television commercial for the Budweiser Corporation.

Built in 1907, the steamer has had quite a lengthy history behind it. Serving the Great Western for 57 years and then strutting its drivers in movies such as "The Professionals", "Breakheart Pass", "The Man Hunters", and James Michner's "Centennial", it is now being used by Budweiser to make a commercial which will show No. 75 in 1880 attire. After being fashioned with a diamond stack, a new headlight, and entirely repainted with its tender in an all black scheme, the locomotive put on quite a show leaving Denver on the morning of May 3rd. Pulling out at 8:50 a.m., the locomotive left the Rocky Mountain Arsenal and received UP 3716 on the point to escort it to the town of Limon on the old Kansas Pacific Railway.

Not many people paced old No. 75 while it put on a grand show. Following the UP 3716 and No. 75 was a heavy-weight, wooden passenger car, two wooden box cars with the Budweiser logo on their sides and a tuscanred caboose which added a lot of style to the rear of the train. After receiving a 20-mph restriction on the "Limon Turn", which the train was called by the Union Pacific, and eating lunch in Deertrail, the entire trip required $7\frac{1}{2}$ hours to travel between Denver and Limon. After the Limon Fire Department filled the tender with water, the rods were oiled, and the climkers were removed from the firebox, the consist was turned around on the old Rock Island wye. Following this manuver, the steam engine received Cadillac & Lake City No. 48 (ex-Santa Fe CF7) on the point to further escort it to the town of Simla, which is on the Cadillac & Lake City, some 23 miles west of Limon. The town of Simla turned out to meet the train when it arrived, even though it was approximately 9:00 p.m. Filming took pplace the next day and continued throughout the week. Film crews planned to be finished and the locomotive . returned to Denver by the 8th of May, if all went well. (Stephen Rasmussen)



MODEL RAILROAD OPEN HOUSE FOR UP TRIP

Pete West, UP Trip Chairman, has made arrangements with the Denver Society of Model Railroaders [Colorado Midland RR] to be open the night before the UP Trip (Friday, June 17th) from 8:00 to 9:30 p.m. All UP ticket holders and RMRRC members are welcome to attend. This "O"-Scale layout has been in continuous existence for 53 years and occupies an area of over 5,000 square feet in the basement of Union Station. Also open that evening will be the Platte River Model Railroad Club [Platte Valley & Western]. This is a new club layout which features standard gauge with some narrow gauge intechange. It is also located in the basement of the Union Station, 1701 Wynkoop, Denver.

NEWS FROM THE CENTRAL CITY AND BLACKHAWK NG RAILROAD

Your editor was recently in Central City and found CC&BNG folks building a new water tank in Central City. As always, these folks are very friendly and took time out to give us the following information:

They are currently running weekends, but will begin daily service on Memorial Day. Current fare is \$3.00 for everyone with summer fares to be \$4.50 for adults and \$3.00 for children. Hours are from 10:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Wednesday through Sunday (Tuesdays off). The No. 71 came through the winter in fine shape with a recent boiler inspection with NO recommendations! There is currently 3,000-feet of track laid with another 1,500 expected by June 1st. The new water tank mentioned above will hold 3500 gallons and gives a more permanent look to the station area which will also have the new ticket office ready this year. Last year, a complete wooden trestle was donated to the railroad and is in

Denver, ready for use. Footings have been surveyed and may be put in this year with the bridge to follow next year if all goes well. Of special interest to railfans and history buffs is the fact that the railroad has surveyed and found the Central City Depot under the tailings. It is their intention to dig out the tailings to uncover the depot, make a yard area and use the tailings for fill down the roadbed in place of two previous trestle locations.
