

Broadway Park-n-Ride at 9:00 AM and ride to I-225 and Parker Road, then I-25 and Lincoln, stopping at two or three new transit stations along the way. We will return to the I-25 and Broadway Park-n-ride at 11:30 AM. At 11:30 we will hand out maps for the afternoon facilities tours and nearby lunch spots. Lunch will be on your own. If you visit both RTD facilities, the tour should end between 3:45 and 4:00 PM.

Starting at 1:00 PM, we will start parallel tours of the RTD Mariposa Transit Control Center at 7th Avenue and Mariposa Street (Denver) and the Elati Maintenance Center on South Elati Street (between Evans and Dartmouth in Englewood). Participants must arrange for their own transportation to lunch and between the Mariposa and Elati facilities.

Due to space limitations, only twelve people can view the new state-of-the-art RTD Mariposa Control Center at a time. For scheduling purposes each group at Mariposa must be limited to 15 minutes. Your tour organizers will assign participants to 15-minute time blocks starting at 1:00 PM with the earliest postmarks assigned the earliest times. The ticket you receive via return mail will show your assigned times at both facilities.

There will be two tours of the Elati Maintenance Center, one at 1:00 PM and one at 2:45 PM. There will be up to 60 people in each Elati tour group. Your tour leaders will coordinate tour times allowing for your driving between the facilities.

Orders must be postmarked by October 11 and tickets will be mailed on October 19.

The Rocky Mountain Railroad Club cannot guarantee we will tour on a LRT train. Deluxe charter busses will be our alternate transportation.

Cost is \$20.00 per person. Lunch is on your own. Seating is limited to 100, so make your reservations early using the form in the September *Rail Report*.

OS Colorado Current Railroad Happenings

"OS" are the initials for On the Sheets, a reference to what station agents did to notify the train dispatcher that a train had passed his/her station and been noted on the train register. OS Colorado is a joint effort to note the rail activities occurring in and around Colorado.

Army Moves Via BNSF

The BNSF used two Kansas City Southern units, SD40-2 687 and SD50 7015, to move a 52-car unit Army train from Texas to Fort Lewis, Washington in late August 2006. The train rolled up the Joint Line via Pueblo to Denver on 8/31/06. The first portion of the train had Oshkosh built Heavy Expanded Mobility Tactical Trucks.

The Army's Heavy Expanded Mobility Tactical Truck (HEMTT) has been the workhorse of the Army's heavy tactical wheeled vehicle fleet since the mid-1980s. Manufactured by the Oshkosh Truck Corporation, the HEMTT is a series of 10-ton, eight-wheel-drive vehicles designed to provide transport capabilities for re-supply of combat vehicles and weapons systems. There are five basic configurations of the HEMTT series trucks.


Rock Train Busy on UP

The Andesite Rock trains have operated in 2006 with four different units now assigned to their Colorado operation. The addition of three Dakota & Iowa RR (DAIR) yellow, black and red striped SD40-2s 3029, 3030 and 3031, provided variety to the operation running over Union Pacific's Greeley line. DAIR 3030 and 3031 were at Carr, Colorado, on Saturday, 9/16/06. The 40-something car train was loaded at the quarry operation on the east side of the tracks.

In 2005 the Andesite rock trains operated with two ex-Denver & Rio Grande Western RR SD45s, DAIR 2701 and 2801. In July 2006, DAIR 2701 (ex-Denver & Rio Grande Western RR 5339) left Commerce City, Colorado, for Loveland, Colorado, where Omnitrax is located. UP


moved the unit on their North Yard, Denver, to North Platte, Nebraska, train.

Back in August 2006, Dakota & Iowa RR (DAIR) units made several daylight appearances running south from Granite, Wyoming, quarry to Old Rolla, Colorado,

where the Andesite Rock Company is located at 7321 East 88 Avenue, Commerce City, Colorado. The 8/16/06 trip had the unit rock train meet several northbound UP trains at Platteville before sunset. The southbound loaded rock train on 8/19/06 ducked into several sidings on

reorganized into two separate divisions. Denver is now the headquarters for the new and improved Colorado Division. It consists of the lines making up the following subdivisions: Akron, Boise City, Brush, Casper, Cody, Dalhart, Front Range, Golden, Pikes Peak, Pueblo, Spanish Peaks and Twin Peaks.

Denver had been the headquarters for the Powder River Basin Division. New banners will replace the Powder River Basin ones soon.

New BNSF TrinityRail Coal Hoppers

BNSF operated an entire train of new (builders date August 2006) TrinityRail built aluminum coal hoppers that originated at the Rawhide Mine, Wyoming, bound for Oklahoma Union, Texas, train C RWMOKO 081. The train was parked at LoDo Siding in Denver on 9/12/06 and was easily seen from the Pepsi Center or from the Speer Boulevard overpass. The cars featured the new BNSF PowerBar emblem on BNSF cars 671600-series hoppers. BNSF SD70MAC 8926 led the 2 x 2 arranged DPU coal load. A fresh crew untied the brakes around 6:00 PM and the train departed.

Reservations must be received by October 10th.







Restored Colorado & Southern No. 9 Operates On The Georgetown Loop Railroad

On August 1, 2006, rebuilt Colorado & Southern Number 9 was formally dedicated on the Georgetown Loop RR.


C&S No. 9 was considered the most famous of the South Park engines. Part of a series (Nos. 4-13) of 1884 Cooke 2-6-0 "moguls," the No. 9 is the only survivor. No. 9 was used extensively throughout the C&S narrow gauge system and made regular trips into Clear Creek County and on the Georgetown Loop. No. 9 pulled both freight and passengers, bringing the last passenger train from Leadville to Denver on April 10, 1937.

After the end of its active service, No. 9 was used as a display locomotive at the New York World's Fair in 1939. From 1940 to 1948 it was stored in Burlington's

Aurora, Illinois, shops. No. 9 then operated at the Chicago Railroad Fair in 1948-1949 and was stored in Illinois again until 1957 when the train was moved to the Black Hills Central excursion railroad in South Dakota for display. It was donated to the Colorado Historical Society in 1988 by Burlington Northern and, in 2004, sent to Uhrich Locomotive Works in Strasburg, Colorado for restoration.
