From the President

Whew! This has been a busy summer. Since our last meeting held in May, many of us enjoyed the Como field trip on June 16th which was handled by Board Member Pat Mauro. And, of course, the visit to the original stone roundhouse at Como was the highlight of this event, although other historic points were included.

The weather warmed up considerably, and due to other conflicts on July 21st, perhaps this was a reason for the low attendance during the Club Day at the Colorado Railroad Museum. However, several familiar faces were seen there, so it was not a total failure. Perhaps some different plans need to be devised, as we may want to look at this further to plan something special next year.

However, the August 18th annual rollout of Denver & Intermountain Car 25 at the Federal Center was very successful. The temperature reached ninety degrees, but that did not prevent a large crowd from attending this event. Everyone enjoyed visiting the trolley and taking rides. The little ones got to ride the miniature trolley too. We are pleased to report the restoration efforts have really shaped up. Hopefully, by the end of 2008, Car 25 will be completed signifying the 20th anniversary of this project. Because of the large crowd our merchandise sales went quite well, bringing in additional revenue toward this project. We sold over half of the great items graciously donated by members, such as books, magazines, pictures, etc. All of the volunteers did a great job, and their efforts are appreciated. Without them it would have been difficult. Our thanks must go out to Darrell Arndt, and everyone else involved, including members and friends who attended. This event is the beginning of our fall fund raising campaign.

And, don't forget our annual luncheon banquet which will be held on Saturday, September 29th at the Lakewood Country Club. In this newsletter we are including another flyer so you may place your order for tickets. Tickets will be mailed, except those requests received late, which can be obtained at the event. Herb Edwards has been instrumental making arrangements for this event. This date had to be set because we were not able to reserve the facility at any other time, due to their current expansion, creating demands on early reservations. We will plan to make our reservations for 2008 earlier.

The program for the banquet has been specially prepared by Dave Gross and Ed Gerlits, who have worked very hard gathering material from the Otto Perry film collection owned by the Club. Ed, former president of the Club, will be the presenter, so this is one event you will not want to miss. Hopefully we will have several long-time Club members in attendance and they will be able to relate their personal experiences with Otto. Additionally, it is planned to provide each person attending this event with a "gift item" currently being put together.

in January of this year, we have had great programs which Joe McMillan has been able to recruit. The doors now open at 6:45 PM allowing time for members and friends to socialize. The brief meeting covering Club related business starts at 7:30 PM, with the program starting at 8 PM. This way we can shut down about 9 PM and put our equipment away. We have an obligation under our contract with the church that we will no longer stay in the building after 9:30 PM.

In February, working with Herb Edwards we moved Club property (book inventory and records) into a smaller storage unit to realize an annual savings of \$780. We will continue to down-size in the future and may consider another move at a later date to reduce storage expenses.

The format change for the newsletter was made at the suggestion of our editor Bruce Nall, based upon present and, of course, future costs for producing this publication. The newsletter is one of our major annual expense items. There is no change in its content, as you may have noticed, because the newsletter is now 16 pages, instead of 8 pages. We received only one written complaint, and many verbal comments expressing positive opinions praising the publication in its new format. Like all changes it takes time. Due to the fact summer meetings were curtailed, and only events were scheduled for June and August, some newsletters were consolidated and postcards mailed as reminders for the events. You may have noticed postage stamps are now affixed instead of the permit.

We found there was no savings using the first class permit (actually cost us extra to have the permit), and it appears using stamps has provided better delivery service than the former method.

During general conversation with members I have been able to clarify some of the reasoning we follow in making decisions regarding the future of the Club. In these conversations I've often referred back to the 2002 survey we conducted. We mailed 780 forms to our membership, and had an overwhelming response. 505 surveys were returned (7 were incomplete making 498), indicating members under age 40 were 14; ages 40 to 60 were 204; and those over age 60 returned 280 forms. It is interesting to note 430 favored steam as their main interest. Narrow gauge was higher than standard gauge, but over 300 preferred both gauges. More members were interested in locomotives. About an equal number were interested in rolling stock and structures. More than half of those members responding indicated they were also modelers. The reason for our concern is based on the recent mailing to membership for the annual fund raising drive which consisted of 610 names. Obviously younger people are not joiners like many of us were and we are not the only organization facing this situation. The computer age is here and it has changed a lot.

The Car 25 rollout was the beginning of our 2007 fund raising campaign for donations toward the Denver & Intermountain Railroad Car No. 25. While on this subject, I want our members and

friends to know I have personally supported this project for over ten years. I would not ask anyone to donate unless I was willing to do so myself. I will put "my money where my mouth is" by personally covering all printing and mailing costs involved in the fund raising letter. I truly hope we can count on your continued support. This year's fund raising is, without a doubt, one of the most critical since we are looking toward the final hurdle getting Car 25 completed. We've had wonderful support from our members and I can assure you that your donations have been used wisely. Please do give this request your attention.

The Club will be celebrating our 70th anniversary in 2008. We will be working toward that goal in the near future and you will be advised as things progress.

At this time I want to express my appreciation and thanks to all of the Board of Directors and Officers of the RMRRC and RMRRHF for a wonderful working relationship. The same appreciation goes to committee chairs and other volunteers. Without them many things could not have proceeded.

Denver & Intermountain Car 25 Roll Out Report

Clear blue skies provided a great day to show off Denver & Intermountain Interurban No. 25 to visitors at the Denver Federal Center on August 18. People of all ages came out to experience the fun of "stepping back into time". The car looked great and we received many compliments.

Adding to the enjoyment of the open house this year were a couple of other attractions. Long time Club member and contributor to the Club and Foundation, Joe Priselac, presented an art show of his transportation paintings. It seemed like there was seldom an empty spot on the floor in front of the paintings as visitors gathered around to view the paintings and visit with the artist. His selection of paintings including a wide variety of rail and non-rail subjects including CB&Q 4-8-4, No. 5629, the tramway at Leyden Jct. with the C&S narrow gauge, and a Rio Grande freight and the Rio Grande Zephyr in the foothills west of Denver. The Trailways bus atop Loveland Pass and a Greyhound bus heading down Route 66 were certainly windows to the past as was the United Airlines DC-8 over Grand Lake. Thanks to Joe for a great presentation.

Gary Collins brought his miniature yellow trolley No. 25 and pulled it behind his garden tractor. This 400 pound replica of a trolley included a real controller, gong, cane seats and authentic advertising car cards. It can be operated with railroad wheels or on rubber tires as was done for the open house. It is an ingenious model that Gary built in 1985 to give the "little ones" a taste of our trolley heritage. It proved to be quite popular to many children. Transportation of the trolley and tractor to the open house was provided by Rich Berens.

Vintage cars stopped by during the day including those from members from the Model A Club. Their great restorations complemented No. 25.

Numerous volunteers helped make the event run smoothly this year including Jim Ehernberger, Dave and Jean Gross, Mike Tinetti and Jimmy and Carolyn Blouch who managed the sales tents. Tom Peyton spent much time cataloging and pricing the numerous items and transporting them all to the site. There was a large selection of books and other items thanks to the generous donations from numerous people including Chuck Baker, Tom Lawry, Erma Morison in

memory of Jack, the Dais family in memory of Rich, Dave Salter, Herb Edwards, John Holzman, John Dillavou, Richard Erickson and Dell McCoy. Thanks to the Denver Rail Heritage Society for the loan of two canopies for shelter.

Preparation of the car during the weeks prior to the open house was accomplished by much work from Tom Peyton, Bob Dunmire, Des Sainsbury, John Russell and Bob Blair. The Denver Federal Center tidied up the area around the building. Don Hulse cut weeds and cleaned up the inside of the car including cleaning of the windows while Lee Ryan cleaned all of the outside windows.

Of course motormen and conductors are needed and those duties were han-

dled by Irwin Chaim, Lee Ryan, Gene McCullough and Bruce Vincent. These fellows are also operators on the Platte Valley Trolley. Tom Peyton was the conductor and provided his latest open house commemorative tickets to about 245 passengers. Tom had also done the flyer announcing the event. Keith Kirby managed the operation of the steps and safe boarding of people.

The No. 25 donation box received generous contribution from the visitors. The funds received will fund the final work on the car and its storage in Building 78. Work that remains includes installation of exterior door hardware and windows, mirrors, floor traps, fabrication and installation of some interior molding, window shades, platform area light-

D&RGW 315 Restoration

After over six years of work, the Durango Railroad Historical Society completed restoration of the 1895 D&RGW locomotive 315, Class C-18. The 315 was restored to the look and operating configuration of 1940, with historical faithfulness and high standards of quality work. This locomotive has not operated in 58 years and has undergone major rebuilding of all systems.

DRGW 315 was moved by highway to the Durango rail yard in mid-August to

South Park Adventure Summer Field Trip By Pat Mauro

The first summer field trip of the Park County Historical Society (PCHS) was combined with the Rocky Mountain Railroad Club on June 16, 2007. Nearly 50 people enjoyed a lovely morning tour of historic locations along the Denver South Park & Pacific narrow gauge route from Bailey to Como. Beginning at Mc-Graw Park in Bailey, the group inspected the old Colorado and Southern (C&S) caboose there as well as the Glen Isle way station that was moved to the park.

Next the field trip proceeded to Kenosha Pass to view the reconstructed wye switch and interpretive historic markers showing old photos of stations, track routes and trains. At Jefferson we all thanked the Maverick Real Estate for allowing the group to tour the Jefferson Depot that now functions as the realty office. We also inspected the former site of the old Jefferson Station Water Tank (now just a pile of old wood).

At the Como Roundhouse we were treated to many railroad relics and a photographic display of DSP&P / C&S railroad history. The group then had the pleasure of rolling old Boxcar 608 out of the roundhouse to inspect and photograph. The original boxcar built by Litchfield in 1879 finally made it back to Como in 2006 thanks to the donation by Gary Rosenberg. After its 25-year use as DSP&P-C&S rolling stock, Boxcar 608 began its long alternate use: 16 years as a storage shed and then 83 years as a summer cabin. Old boxcars rarely die they are just rolled away. We are happy to see it back on the line, so to speak.

Watch for news of the next field trip to see more Colorado railroad history.
