### Notes From The President By Dave Goss

It isn't mainline steam, but the smell of coal smoke drifting through the canyon brings back memories. The haunting whistle of Tiny Town's 2-6-0 Number #10 sounds remarkably like other larger narrow gauge locomotives, but this miniature only hauls families through the historic town site in South Turkey Creek Canyon. It was a beautiful morning on August 18th when the Tiny Town Railroad offered Club members and the public the chance to experience a little narrow gauge railroading in an historic amusement park established in 1915. Steam locomotives #10 and #22 work the line regularly, in partnership with diesel number 1087 which is painted in colors reminiscent of the Rio Grande's yellow and black striped engines. A number of members and their families joined hundreds of others to see the small historic buildings and enjoy the lovely weather. By 11:00 AM the parking lot was filled and many families were wandering the grounds. What was most interesting that almost every child seemed enthralled to see and ride behind locomotive #10. Their giggles, smiles and excitement were contagious. Maybe there is hope for a younger generation to find fascination in modern railroading just like their fathers, grandfathers, uncles and others have done. If you haven't visited this unique museum recently, it is well worth a visit. See their website for more details.

# Information For The Rail Enthusiast

Railroads carried 38% more US crude oil and petroleum products during the first half of 2012 compared with 2011, mostly as a result of increased oil production from North Dakota's Bakken shale formation. In Colorado, a new oil

loading point will be built for the Denver-Julesburg Basin. The Tampa facility is located northeast of Denver between Keenesburg and Roggen on the BNSF, and is designed to receive crude oil via truck and pipeline and to load trains at a rate of up to 68,000 barrels per day.

Genesee & Wyoming Inc. has agreed to buy RailAmerica Inc. for \$1.39 billion, a move that combines the two largest short-line and regional railroad operators in North America. The combined company will operate 108 railroads in the United States and abroad. RailAmerica owns the Kyle Railroad, which runs from east-central Kansas to Limon, Colorado, as well as the short-line Nebraska, Kansas & Colorado Railway. General Electric announced the July roll-out of the 5,000th Evolution Series locomotive, in production since 2005. This unit was delivered to Union Pacific under the road number 7964, and was part of the Frontier Days train with UP 844. G.E. says that the Evo Series puts out 40% less emissions than earlier models.

During the D&S Railfest in August, the "Eureka" and its train came upon a badly injured man who had fallen near the track south of Silverton, Colorado. The crew and medical personnel were able to transport him by rail motor car and then helicopter to a hospital in Durango. It is likely that this person was trying to photograph the train from a

high rocky spot, and slipped. A photo is not worth getting killed for, even with a 137 year-old 4-4-0 steam engine.

The Apache Railway in Arizona is known for still using a fleet of Alco diesel locos. Their largest customer is a paper recycling mill at Snowflake, which now plans to close at the end of September due to dwindling demand.

Nippon Sharyo is opening a new facility to build passenger cars in Rochelle, Illinois. The company will spend about \$35 million for a factory designed for annual production of around 120 new passenger cars of various types. The city and state offered several million dollars worth of incentives, and there should be about 250 employees there by the end of 2013.

Union Pacific 844 made a UP 150 years celebration trip to the Iowa State Fair, Kansas City, Missouri, and Sharon Springs, Kansas. The train made stops August 17, 2012 along the former Kansas Pacific line (AKA Limon Subdivison) stopping at Kit Carson, Limon and Strasburg, Colorado. The train passed construction projects; New UPRR 3-track Brunskill Yard (upper right behind train), second UPRR bridge over Sand Creek (note steel pilings this side of UP 844) and Denver RTD's East Rail Line double track Sand Creek Bridge (lower right, under construction). This location is east of Denver near former Stapleton International Airport.

The East Rail line is a 22.8-mile commuter rail transit corridor that will operate between Denver Union Station and Denver International Airport (DIA). The rail line will connect these two important areas while serving adjacent employment neighborhoods and development areas in Denver and Aurora.
