

#### Otto Perry: Master Railroad Photographer

Otto was one of the great railroad photographers of the first half of the 20th century. He recorded the passage of steam and, later on, early diesel powered trains beginning in 1913 and continuing through the 1960s. While best remembered for his views of Colorado railroading, his activity extended throughout the United States, Canada and even into Mexico and Europe. He did not neglect airplanes, ships, trucks and buses, either. His collection of over 20,000 negatives has been preserved in the Denver Public Library Western History / Genealogy Department and is fully accessible on the library's website. Tonight's program will be a journey through the years with Otto, including some reminiscences of his very colorful personality.

The D&RGHF will provide their "Silver Streak" to carry our Club members, and we'll also be able to rotate attendees through some of the motorcars, depending on which operators have an open seat and are willing to take a rider. The NARCOA group is a very friendly bunch and they're all usually very happy to share their cars and their enthusiasm for the hobby with others, so more than likely anyone who wants a ride in one of the cars will be able to find one. Between the motorcars and the Streak, we can accommodate 20-25 people each day.

There's not an hard cutoff date as with the Strasburg trip, but we'd greatly appreciate if you'd get your sign up forms back to us by September 21st so that we can give the D&RGHF and motorcar operators an idea of how many people we're bringing. For safety reasons, we would ask that you please wear long pants and sturdy, closed-toe shoes.

For those arriving on Friday, our NARCOA contact, John Keeling, told me the motorcar operators will be out testing their operating skills and safe operating knowledge. As these folks operate excursions in cooperation with many active railroads, safe and reliable operation is paramount. If you're at all interested in learning what it takes to own and operate a motorcar, it'll be a great opportunity to experience it first-hand. Our members are welcome to come watch and learn.

The other piece of exciting news I have to announce is the selection of our banquet speaker. Thanks to Dave Schaaf's hard work, our presenter this year will be none other than "Dr. Colorado" himself, Dr. Tom Noel. Dr. Noel is a Professor of History and Director of




The Cumbres and Toltec Scenic Railroad have turned their passenger cars and locomotives on a wye in Chama but one of the legs was very short and could not be used to turn an entire train. That all changed during late June and early July 2014. The track was in service by their goal of July 4th. The crew could turn the west bound train that arrived at 4:15 and get it serviced for the 4th of July Special scheduled to depart Chama at 5:30. The line was laid out with a sharp curve at the crossing of Manzanita Street resulting in less dirt work for the roadbed fill. By adding this new track the railroad feels that the crew not only will save time getting the train turned for the next trip but it also saves crossing Highway 17 multiple times, a safety issue as the crossings do not have gates. – Photo © 2014 Nathan Zachman.

Free Rides, Weather Permitting









#### Events of Railroad History: Drama on the Silverton Railroads

Engine Leaves Track – Silverton, Colo., July 24. From The *Colorado Sun*, July 25, 1891

Engine No. 100, pulling the passenger train to Red Mountain on the Silverton Railroad, was derailed this afternoon near the Burro bridge by a broken rail and thrown over on one side. Engineer William Spear was badly scalded on the leg by escaping steam, and he was brought to town on a hand car. Nobody else was hurt. The passenger cars were brought back to Silverton. A wrecking train will be on hand early in the morning, and trains will be running on time by noon.

## Cool Conductor Saves 20 Lives – Silverton, Colo., Feb. 15. From The *Denver Republican*, February 16, 1907

Through the presence of mind of Carl Barnes, conductor on the Gladstone branch of the Silverton & Northern Railroad, the lives of a coach load of people numbering over 20 were saved today. The train was climbing a steep grade a mile from here at 9 o'clock this morning, when without warning the rear coach became detached and at once started back down the grade. There was a rush by all in the car for the doors, and they fought to get out.

Conductor Barnes set the handbrakes slowing the car and directed the people to be calm and orderly. Then, letting them out of the coach one by one, they jumped from the moving car, and none was injured. Conductor Barnes remained on the car until the last passenger had left it, by which time it was going at high speed, so that when he jumped, he was painfully injured but will recover. The coolness of the conductor undoubtedly saved the lives of all in the car. Hardly had the conductor jumped when the car left the tracks, rolled down a steep embankment, and was smashed into bits.

The train was climbing a steep grade up Boulder mountain, and before the conductor could set the hand brakes, the car had gained considerable speed. The coach had traveled fully a quarter of a mile before it finally left the track and was wrecked.
