The occasion was that the gas electric motor car broke down and the 709 was sent out from Sterling to rescue the motor train on its westward journey to Sterling. The photo was taken by Club member Joseph C. Hardy, relief telegraph operator, and later train dispatcher.


This locomotive was originally B&MR #63 when built at the Havelock, Nebraska shop in 1901. It was re-numbered 909 in 1951, and had operated on the Cheyenne line. It was sold for scrap in November of 1953.

# **RGS Passenger Coach 252 Restoration**

The Rocky Mountain Railroad Historical Foundation's grant of \$1000 has assisted the Ridgway Railroad Museum with the restoration of the woodwork in RGS passenger coach 252. Completion of the rest room area is the next item on their interior work list.

Restoration continues with fabrication of trucks in Durango. By next spring all that will remain is having new period correct seats made, then the car will be complete and capable of being operated behind our steam locomotive, perhaps as soon as late summer 2020.

Elections are held every December at the annual business meeting.





Denver & Rio Grande 168 restoration has been completed! The D&RG 168, a 4-6-0 built by Baldwin Locomotive Works in 1883, was retired to Colorado Springs, Colorado, Antlers Park, on August 1, 1938. The 168 was D&RG class 47. The Cumbres & Toltec Scenic RR restoration crew deserves a big THANKS! First operation was September 27, 2019. Stathi Pappas oversaw the restoration to operation at the Cumbres & Toltec Scenic RR Antonito, Colorado, shop. In the distance was C&TS 488, K-36, at Antonito on October 3, 2019.

# Fort Collins Municipal Railway News and Open House

On July 20, 2019, Fort Collins Municipal Railway Car 25 ran under its own power for the first time in about 68 years.


Restoration crews installed a power supply in the Howes barn which puts out about 2/3 of the normal line power. This lower power allowed them to actually run the car in the barn to check out the circuits recently installed by Charlie Rock after a multi-year project involving totally rebuilding the two controllers, and to check other systems affected by the reassembly.

Since the restoration also involved new wheels, axles, and wheel bearings, the ability to run the car in the barn allowed them to see how the new parts would actually function together, while the Mountain barn is being expanded to accommodate the car

An open house to allow people to see the progress on Car 25 is scheduled for Saturday, December 7th, from 9:00 AM to Noon in the Howes Street barn at 330 North Howes Street in Fort Collins. Light refreshments will be served and Santa will make an appearance.

## Denver South Park & Pacific Boxcar 608 at Como





Boxcar 608, a 1879 Litchfield Car and Machinery Works product for the DSP&P RR, came home to Como on September 20, 2019. It has been restored as an "interpretive display." One side and one end were restored to as built and will be lettered in the spring and the other side (top photo) was just patched up where the wood was missing to show its construction and history, and also to show the original DSP&P RR lettering.

# Vagrant Car Assessments: Sum Due on Cars That Run Unattached

Denver Times, September 16, 1898 Contributed by Dan Edwards

Colorado is the second state in the union to levy a state assessment upon independent car lines, the rolling stock of the transportation companies, refrigerator companies and the like that are run over lines of other railroad companies.

The following table shows the assessment of the different car lines in Arapahoe county as fixed by the state board of equalization:
